



If you were a genre in a movie or series which genre will you be?

Mrs. Ola: "Any kind of mysteries and suspense. I always look for something that is related to mystery. I also like everything that is related to philosophy."



"Whom do you look up to? Who is your role model?"

Mrs. Ola: "The prophet may peace be upon him because he has been through a lot and he overcame everything in a very difficult time.

Going to Canada and continuing my studies there, I was raised as a proud Muslim in addition to accepting and respecting everyone else. That is why I follow rules a lot. For example, if wearing the hijab is a rule from Allah, I am an obedient person and very passionate about what being obedient does to yourself in all kinds of religions. I've studied all kinds of religious studies and realized that most of them follow similar rules. Even the way we pray and fast is all a part of how we accept to be obedient to a larger power which is Allah (SWT). There are reasons why our religion is the last and why it is the end of all religions. It's the last one because it doesn't only have the spiritual part, but also the law that shows you where to go in every step in your life, alhamdulilah."

"If you could travel to any year in a time machine, which year would you choose and why?"

Mrs. Ola: "It is a good question. I love the age I'm in. For example, I am not very nostalgic about being in the past. I like the Google and the technology part, and I don't see myself living in a place where I don't have this much access to knowledge."

"What is one thing that motivates you every day to wake up and go to school?"

Mrs. Ola: "What motivates me is the love of knowledge, my work, and being passionate about seeing the kids. Even if students are not here in the weekends, you will always find me every Saturday at school out of passion.

"So, if you weren't a principal would you want to be anything else?" Mrs. Ola: "I'm sure I am a principal since the day I was born."

"What makes you angry in general?"

Mrs. Ola: "Being angry is one of satan's traits that is not related to a believer. If there is something I can do, I shouldn't be angry about it because I will be able to solve it. If it is something out of my hands, so it is related to a larger power. I might be upset about a few things like seeing some injustice in the world, but I won't be angry. For example, if students do not follow rules, there are many ways to make them love to follow rules. For example in grade 1C, the students create their own rules. They have a very good teacher, and she's someone who creates the rules by the students. If someone does something bad in the class, they would have a meeting as a whole class and have a discussion to come up with a rule. Giving freedom is essential for a principal. It's not a "one" size that fits all. Freedom is necessary to enhance creativity in schools.

"As a child were you the shy and quiet kid or more outgoing and more of an extrovert?"

Mrs. Ola: "I was shy and quiet most of the times. I used to think a lot and read a lot. By the age of thirteen I've read all the classic books in Arabic, English and French.

What is your greatest accomplishment?

Mrs. Ola: "Building this reputation and building this school in Saudi Arabia when not only foreign people couldn't do this, even women couldn't do this easily. When I came to Riyadh everyone would say, "What? Saudi Arabia? What would you do there? You can't even drive a car there!" I said I can do anything. If I can do it here, I can do it anywhere. So I believe that my accomplishment is this school."



"Are you planning to open any other schools somewhere else?"

Mrs. Ola: "I'm willing to move to a very good campus. After that yes, I will think of opening like two or three more schools, but only girls' schools, that's what I want. I would always keep it a small school, for I don't like big schools. So we'll keep it this way but I think in a different campus."




What do you view as your important contribution to the daily operations of your school?"

Mrs. Ola: "Being here all the time, and being involved. If you come at five o'clock you will find me here. I'm the first to come and the last to leave. Even though I can come, leave and take a vacation whenever I want, I want to set an example and a model for everyone that we can do this every day. Do you see this book? It is a book that I give every year to my seniors, it's called Outliers. Do you know what's an outlier?"

- "Yeah, it's someone who's different"

Mrs. Ola: "In statistics there is a regression line and the statistics spread points for anything that you're talking about. An outlier is someone who stands out from all the people that are here. So, outliers are the successful people. What makes you successful is that you can never do something the same way and you're not excellent about it. For example, waking up early every morning for three hundred sixty five days a year makes me someone who loves to wake up early and it's something that you will learn and prepare yourself for. They say you can never wake up before dawn for three hundred sixty five days a year and not be rich!"





"Why do you consider "Outliers" an important book?"

Mrs. Ola: "It's a book that truly changed my life. It was published in 2008.'I read it and I realized that there are many things in it that resemble me. That's why it's the book I give every year to my seniors."



OUR MORNINGS AT AL SAHAFA










In addition, we would like to thank PSU for allowing us to experience such a competitive yet delightful event." We congratulate our winners and thank everyone who contributed to their success.

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


Happiness always comes to souls who deserve it and tend to be content no matter what.



The leaders of the movement back then mainly focused on securing votes for women. Women and even some men had been fighting for women's suffrage for over a century. They directed speeches, marched in parades, signed petitions and often argued about how women deserve all the rights and responsibilities of a citizen just like men do. Some of the leaders of this movement were Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Susan B. Anthony, Alice Paul, Lucy Stone, Ida B. Wells, and Lucretia Mott. They were great women's rights activist that a statue of Elizabeth, Susan, and Lucretia stands in the rotunda of the U.S Capitol. They had helped build a movement dedicated to women's suffrage and pushed lawmakers to guarantee their rights during Reconstruction.

There are 12 countries that give women their equal rights, and they are Belgium, Canada, Denmark, France, Greece, Iceland, Ireland, Latvia, Luxembourg, Portugal, Spain, and Sweden. But equality under the law does not equal equality in sentiment, and just because the law gives women equality doesn't mean we are completely free to do what we want. Women get treated differently based on their race, religion, size, and many other things which is not fair because you determine what type of a person they are based off their personalities, not their beliefs and physical appearance.

Back in the days, women were viewed as nothing more than housewives, and they had no to little rights to do anything. Despite that it's been over century since women in the United States got their right to vote, they are still far from being equal with men. Some people believe that women are already equal to men, or they just haven't worked as hard as men have to get to where they are. While others may disagree by saying that society does not view men and women equally, and that yes, women are always going to be underestimated. 



Study Efficiently Using the Pomodoro Technique:

If you find yourself struggling to finish assignments before the deadline or getting to exams wishing you had found the time to study more you are not alone. Many students struggle with managing time for their studies, and in today's interconnected busy world it is no wonder.

The method is based on studying in timed intervals. In fact Cirillo named it after the timer he used which happened to be shaped like a tomato (pomodoro in Italian). Cirillo found that breaking large tasks up into smaller manageable timed units (called "pomodoros") is the most effective way to study. How it Works

The Pomodoro Technique works like this:

1) Decide what you want to accomplish and estimate how long you will study for. Then break your work into pomodoros.

2) Set a timer for 25 minutes, and start studying. (There are many pomodoro apps available for your phone, or follow along with someones study session on YouTube).

3) Minimize your distractions during the pomodoro interval. If a thought pops into your head write it down. If a friend calls let them know you will call them back later..

4) After 25 minutes take a short 5-10 minute break. Grab a coffee, go for a walk, call back your friend, or do something else relaxing.

5) Repeat. After 4 pomodoros take a longer break for 20-30 minutes.

Cooking Recipes

Fudgy brownies

- 1. Melt together the chocolate and butter.
- 2.Once melted add the brown sugar, coffee, and eggs.
- 3. Add the dry ingredients.
- 4. Pour the mixture into a greased and floured pan lined with parchment paper.
- 5. Bake the brownies in a preheated oven at 180 °C (350 °F) for around 35 minutes. Do not overbake. See the toothpick test in the video to understand exactly when to take the brownies out of the oven, so they end up perfectly fudgy with a crackly top.
- 6. Cool for 30 minutes then cut into bars.

Ingredients

260 g (2¼ sticks) Butter

350 g (13 oz) Chocolate 70% cocoa

1 or 2 tbsp Unsweetened coffee depending on preference

4 large eggs

150 g (1 cup + 2 tbsp) All-purpose flour

30 g (3 tbsp) unsweetened cocoa powder

1/2 tsp Salt

400 g (2 cups) Sugar

1-minute Chocolate Chip Cookie

Method

- 1. Melt the butter in the microwave.
- 2.Add the brown sugar and room temperature milk, and mix to combine.
- 3. Mix the dry ingredients together in another bowl the flour, baking soda, and salt.
- 4.Stir the dry ingredients together with the wet ingredients until a dough forms.
- 5.Add chocolate chips and bring the dough together with your hands.
- 6.Form an 8 to 9 cm (3 3.5 inch) diameter cookie and press it down onto a piece of parchment paper. It's important to make the cookie this size to cook correctly in the microwave.
- 7.Place the cookie on the parchment paper in your microwave and cook on high for 1 minute.
- 8.Allow the cookie to cool for 5 minutes or it will fall apart. During this time the cookie will be set up slightly.

Ingredients

20 g (1½ tbsp) Butter

25 g (1¾ tbsp) Brown sugar

10 g (¾ tbsp) Milk

55 g (¹/₃ cup + ¹/₂ tbsp) All purpose flour

¹/₈ tsp Baking soda

Pinch of salt

Chocolate chips

Tips

Please be precise and use the exact amounts given in the recipe.

Every microwave is different. The cook time in your microwave could be anywhere between 1 minute and 1 minute and 15 seconds. Be careful to not overcook the cookie.

Once it comes out of the microwave it should be very soft. Allow the cookie to cool for 5 minutes to allow it to set before eating.




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1. To Kill a Mockingbird by Harper Lee

5. Jane Eyre by Charlotte Bronte



6. Moby Dick by Herman Melville



8. Murder on the Orient Express by Agatha Christie



Rating: 4.3/10 Genre: Historical movie


11. Harry Potter y J.K Rowling
